NECESSARY INFORMATION. Essential to distinguish which thing or person we are talking about.

(=I have more than one brother and I called the one that lives in Ontario)

#### WE CAN USE THAT

We CAN use THAT instead of WHO/WHICH.

That's the mug WHICH/THAT I bought in Paris.

#### RELATIVE PRONOUNS CAN BE OMITTED




