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392. Course objectives: - The

aim of the course is to introduce the student to the history of Arab thought and whether there was a cultural and intellectual movement among the Arabs before Islam, as well as to know the extent of the influence of Islamic religion on the growth and development of this thought. It is natural that this religion transferred the Arab mind to a qualitative shift and freed it from pre-Islamic restrictions and dependencies. In this course, we

discussed several topics, starting with: - Arab thought before the advent of Islam, where we discussed some of the features of Arab thought, and then its most prominent manifestations. We found that poetry and literature were the most prominent

features of this era, as well as stories, oratory, and others. The course moved to the state of Arab thought under Islam and the influence of this religion from several aspects, including

religious, economic, literary and scientific aspects. We also discussed the role of translation and its impact on Arab-Islamic thought, as

translation was divided into several stages, including translation in the Umayyad era as well as translation in the Abb

A prominent course covered the sciences for which the Arab mind has become famous under peace, such as the transmitted sciences such as the sciences of the Holy Qur'an.
