Present perfect continuous (I have been doing)

Have / has been (v)+ing is the present perfect continuous

I / we / they / you have (= I've etc.) doing she / he / it has (= he's etc.) been working playing

➤ We use the present perfect continuous for an activity that has recently stopped or just stopped. There is a connection with <u>now.</u>

(study this example situation):

It has been raining

Is it raining?

No, but the ground is wet.

It has been raining.

- **♣** Paul is very tired. He's been working very hard. (=he's tired now)
- Why are your clothes so dirty? What have you been doing?
- ♣ I have been talking to Amanda about the problem and she agrees with
 me.
- **♣** Where have you been? **I've been looking** for you everywhere.
- > Study this example situation (It has been raining for two hours)

(this mean, it began raining two hours ago and it is still raining).

How long has it been raining?

It has been raining for two hours.

- ➤ We use the present perfect continuous in this way with how long, for.... And since..... The activity is still happening (as in this example) or has just stopped.
 - **How long have** you **been learning** English? (= you're still learning English)
 - Tim is still watching television. He's been watching television all day.
 - **♣** Where have you been ? **I've been looking** for you **for the last half hour.**
 - **♣** Chris **hasn't been feeling** well **recently**.
- > You can use the present perfect continuous for action repeated over a period of time.
- **♣** Debbie is a very good tennis player. **She's been playing since she was eight.**
- Every morning they meet in the same café. They've been going there for years.

<u>Present perfect continuous and simple</u> (I have been doing and I have done)

> Study this example situation:

(Kate's clothes are covered in paint)
She has been painting the ceiling.
Has been painting is the present perfect continuous.

(The ceiling was white. Now it is red.) She **has painting** the ceiling. **Has painting** is the present perfect continuous.

Compare these example:

- **1-** My hands are very dirty. I've been repairing the car.
- **2-** Joe **has been eating** too much recently. He should eat less.
- **3-** Where have you been? **Have** you **been playing** tennis?
- **1-** The car is OK again now. I've repaired it.
- **2-** Somebody **has eaten** all my chocolates. The box is empty.
- **3- Have** you ever **played** tennis?
- ➤ We use the perfect continuous to say *how long* (for an activity that is still happening):
- We use the present simple to say how much, how many or many times (for completed).

Exg:

- How long have you been reading that book?
- How much of that book **have** you read?
- ♣ They've been playing tennis since 2 o'clock.
- They've played tennis three times this week.
- > Some verbs (for example, **know / like / believe**) are not normally used in the continuous: **see past continuous for explain many these verbs.**
- I've known about it for a long time. (not I've been knowing)
- For the list verbs in past continuous (you can use **want**, **mean** in th present perfect continuous.
- **4** I've been meaning to phone Jane, I keep forgetting.

> For and since:

We use **for** and **since** to say how long something has been happening.

We use for + a period of time (two hours, six weeks etc..):
I've been waiting for two hours

Two hours ago ────>now

	(For)	
Two hours	a long time	a week
20 minutes	six months	ages
Five days	50 years	years

- > Sally has been working here **for six months**. (*not* since six months)
- ➤ I haven't seen Tom **for three days**. (not since three days)
- ♣ We use since + the start of a period (8 o'clock, Monday, 1999 etc..).
 I've been waiting since 8 o'clock.

8 o'clock———→*now*

- > Sally has been working here **since April.** (=from April until now)
- ➤ I haven't seen Tom **since Monday.** (=from Monday until now)

(We don't use the present perfect (I have done) when you talk about a <u>finished</u> time (for example, yesterday / ten minutes ago / in 1999 / when I was a child). (in the situation we use a <u>past tense</u>:

- **↓** It was very cold yesterday. (not has been)
- **♣** Paul and Lucy **arrived ten minutes ago.** (not have arrived)
- **♣** Did you eat a lot of sweet when you were a child? (not have you eaten)
- **↓** I got home late **last night. I was** very tired and **went** straight to bed.

(We use the past to ask **When.....?** Or **What time.....?**:

- **When did** your friends arrive? (not have.....arrived)
- **What time did** you **finish** work?

> Present perfect (have done)

♣ I've done a lot of work today.


(We use the present perfect for a period of time that continues until now.

For example (today, this week, since 1985)



Past simple (did)

I did a lot of work yesterday.
(We use the past simple for <u>a finished</u> time in the past. For example:
(yesterday, last week, from 1985 to 2000.)



Exg.

- ♣ It hasn't rained this week.
 / It didn't rain last week.
- Have you seen Anna this morning. / Did you see Anna this morning.(it is still morning) (it is now afternoon or evening)
- We've been waiting for an hour. / We waited (or were waiting) for an hour.(we are no longer waiting)
- ♣ Ian lives in London. He has lived / Ian lived in Scotland for ten years.here for seven years.Now he lives in London.
